Memories of Chris Remick, RHS Board Member

I first met Chris through my wife Nina early in the century. Both of them are artists and Chris had a gallery at Foye's corner where she represented Nina's art. Chris specialized in folk art and also exhibited at the Collectors Eye in Stratham. We have a Rye theme folk art creation by Chris hanging in the museum.

Her father Tony had a well driling business in town and Chris donated a metal thermometer with his advertising and some great photos of Tony at work drilling. As fellow natives of Rye, Chris and I had fun reminiscing about our youth.

As a deacon at the Rye congregational Church, Chris was able to arrange for some RHS programs there and a few years ago she facilitated a long term loan of all church records (4 file drawers) to the museum. And while she was organizing them in the museum she did the same for our disorganized, but excellent textile collection which still is in need of archiving. Over the years we became very aware of her love for Ireland (the auld sod) and she was so happy when she got Roger and Jan Philbrick to accompany her and Harry on one of their many trips to the old country. Chris even visited the beginning point of the first successful Trans-Atlantic cable to the US that began in Ballyinskellig, County Kerry, Ireland, via Tor Bay Nova Scotia and terminated in Rye in 1874. She created an album of that historical location on display in the museum.

She was one of those rare people who served on all three town organizations/ town government bodies related to history: The Rye Historical Society, The Rye Heritage Commission and the Historic District Commission, a model of civic engagement.

Chris helped RHS to revive its membership a few years ago, laying a foundation that in 2017 propelled RHS to over 100 members. In my last conversation with Chris in mid- June while she was staffing the museum, I brought six envelopes from the post office, the latest six members. After she opened them she beamed and exclaimed:"We'll make it to 100 easily!

In 2008 Chris had a column in Fosters called "Wry View "and thanks to RHS board member, James Tegeder, we now have four of them for the museum archives. Her sense of humor and clever writing were on display in these columns and here are some excerpts from one called: Hopping Down the Bunny Trail.

"My corned beef – which is not eaten in the auld sod – is ready for the pot....I would never, ever add beets to corned beef and cabbage, especially since that makes the fodder less Irish and more New England boiled dinner. Erin Go Bragh!....The older I get, the idea of tradition gains importance. Perhaps as I age, I'm becoming a relic of the past and hope to be treasured too." Indeed.

In 2015 my son in law Ryan Balas and my daughter Deirdre made an independent film in Rye called "Hymns" and Chris allowed them to film her in the church. As Ryan wrote, she showed the kindness of strangers to them. This footage has been shared with Dan and Mathew. When I watched it today I was very moved by her devotion to her church and her town. Her humanity shone through brightly. Chris, we will miss you very much. Thank you for all you gave to us and to Rye.
