A Lofty Sign

Barns are beautiful buildings in and of themselves. Sometimes what's in them is even better.

Recently, the Werner family on Washington Road called us over to see something up in the loft of their barn. There it was — a piece of Rye's 20th century history and one that impacts us all to this day.

It's a painted wooden sign, measuring about 4'X4' and advertises the Parsons Park Corporation, created in 1977 by 151 Rye families to raise monies to buy the property in the center of town being sold for \$200,000 by Esther Parsons. According to Alex Herlihy, representing one of those families, "We raised \$50,000 as a down payment and then offered it for sale



to the town using this sign, which was posted where the Christmas tree is today."

Over the next couple of years, the town did buy the field and then purchased the forest. According to Alex, "To her eternal credit, Esther waited patiently for this great success to play out because she wanted it to happen and not for it to be a subdivision."

And that's the story of why today we have Parsons Field, the site of so many town events. So, next time you're enjoying that open, beautiful space, thank Esther Parsons and the Parsons Park families for their foresight and community activism.

Oh, and what about the sign? Well, the Werners generously donated it to the Rye Historical Society! With the help of Mike Badger and Steve Cash, we got it down from its "home" of many, many years and brought it to the Museum. We are evaluating its condition and, because of its size, we need to understand how we can safely display it, even temporarily. We appreciate your patience as we figure all that out.

In the meantime, join us in thanking the Werner family for their interest and action in preserving an important piece of Rye history.

The camera's Eye on Rye

One Saturday morning, Karlotta Shanahan walked into the town museum with an envelope filled with treasures. A descendent of the Perkins family, she wanted the Historical Society to have a collection of photographs, ranging from the late 19th century to the 1960s. Among them are a photographic series of a storm along the Rye shore, the building of a portion of the jetty at Rye Harbor, class photos of Rye Elementary and Rye Junior High schools, and the "Tower House" on Perkins Road. Of particular interest is a late 19th/early 20th century interior-office photo that includes Frank Locke — but, what is the business? There are also two rarely seen19th-century cabinet cards of children, Tony & Cecelia Francis, identified as being part of the family from Old Town Maine, who set up a tent on the Farragut Hotel grounds to sell baskets and other handicrafts.

Thank you, Karlotta, for these interesting and welcomed additions to our collection!



Holiday Historic Home Tour




August, 1837

Congregational Church Raised

With the retirement of Huntington Porter, Rye's long-serving third pastor, the congregation realized that the 1756 meetinghouse also needed replacing. Rye was by then a town rather than a parish, so a Congregational Society was formed to build a new church.

The 1837 church, pictured above, received major enhancements in 1891. including a portico, a clock and black walnut pews. Unfortunately, a disastrous fire leveled the building in 1959.

The rebuilt Congregational Church that graces Rye Center today was dedicated in June, 1961.
