# RYE HISTORICAL SOCIETY AND TOWN MUSEUM

In writing a new history of Rye, I am including many of our 18th and 19th century homes and the families who built them. Dating old houses is not easy and often architectural historians tend to be the best resources unless there is specific and verifiable written documentation. Most dates that are claimed on house plaques and in written records at the museum definitely are approximate and need a "c." in front of the date. Indeed a few of these dates may be off by a half century or more.



However there are two styles of houses that we can state, as a general rule, were built in the 1600's and 1700's and those are the two and one half story center chimney style about 30'x 40' (see the Simon Jenness home above, 1773) and the one and a half story center chimney, cape style on a slightly smaller footprint. The larger house often started as a half house version or a cape style and was enlarged as families grew. The pitch of the roofs, windows, space between floors, chimneys, etc. all give a clue to the time period in which they were built. Based on written records and a town wide visual inventory, there are approximately forty houses in Rye built before 1800 and the original parts of a few of them date back before 1700.

19th century farmhouses tended to be taller and narrower. More formal houses were in the Georgian, hip roof style, such as the two early 1800's homes facing each other in Rye center on either side of the church. Starting in the 1820's, other new new styles emerged such as Greek revival and later, early Victorian. A future article will address this far larger number of Rye houses.
