## February "House of the Month" 121 Garland Road

The Rye Historical Society has started a new program to highlight historically important homes and roads in Rye and Rye Beach. Called "The House/Road of the Month", a different home or road will be featured in our e newsletter and in Rye Magazine.

For our first house in the series, we are pleased to tell you about 121 Garland Road, the "Garland House". This historic Rye homestead was built in 1845 by Moses Garland and his brother Rufus. Moses Garland was married to Adeline

The Garland House was built in the Colonial Revival Style with a pediment and glass around front door and traditional wooden clapboards. It boasts a 12 foot center chimney with 4 fireplaces. Interior details include rosettes at the corners of the molding, a simple pine wood kitchen and a granite stone foundation which can be viewed from basement. Another interior treasure is an

oak banister and stairs in front entrance, completely preserved and still used till this day.

Like many of the homesteads in Rye, the house was a dairy farm and chicken farm. Today it sits on approximately. 3.5 acres of land, but originally the farm was probably close to 8 acres in total.. A huge fire destroyed the dairy barn around. 1974. The barn has been rebuilt using same post and beam construction.

We chose the Garland House because it is the subject of the most recent donation to and exhibit at the RHS. Please visit the museum to see the Garland House heirloom donations exhibit. Included in the donation are heirloom china, silver spoons engraved with family names, baby shoes, a sampler from 1807, binoculars, old Rye postcards and much more.

### **Research Begins on Rye Beach History**

In late 2016, the Toohey family generously donated \$5,000 to the RHS for the purpose of researching and promoting the history of the Rye Beach precinct. Jennifer King, UNH Museum Studies graduate is the research associate for the Rye Beach project.

The research will pave the way for highlighting these and other important aspects of the history of Rye Beach at the RHS and within the community. Among the topics that will be comprehensively researched are the hotels and boarding houses of Rye Beach (the Toohey home was one of the hotels).

- Jen has unearthed fascinating archivalinformation relating to the history of the Toohey's home at 18 Sea Road, theformer Rye Beach Inn.
- We are creating a large map of Rye Beach tolocate all the pertinent buildings and sites related to the hotel and boardinghouse resort era (1840's 1970's).
- Fred Clark has provided a wealth of informationthat his mother, Susan Sawyer Clark, passed on to him relating to Sawyer'sBoarding House, which was located on Sea Road.
- When this project is completed, it will be vailable for public viewing in the form of exhibit panels and possibly abooklet and a film.

### The Summer Resort of Rye in 1917

The first car was registered in Rye in 1913, but for manyyears after, they had to share the road with all manner of horse and oxen drawnwagons and buggies. In 1917 most of the early cars appeared only occasionallyat any of Rye's eight hotels and many more boarding houses.

The more affordable Model T (\$500 on credit) was not yet asprominent and the roads were still mostly dirt, although Ocean Boulevard was of the best quality, having been built 1902-04 as a major connecting coastal linkbetween the New England states.

Frank Drake donated the hotel guest register (1915-1938) from DrakeHouse to the museum and there one can read names from all over NewEngland, eastern Canada and all the great American cities from as far away asSt. Louis which had a strong connection to the resort community from the earlydays.

The country was about to go to war, and many wealthy formerhotel patrons had started building homes in Rye Beach. The Victorian Hotel Resort era would go intoslow decline and was replaced by a huge influx of middle class people drivingvehicles and demanding cabins, camping areas and restaurantswhich Rye was only glad to provide.
