What got you interested in the history of Rye?

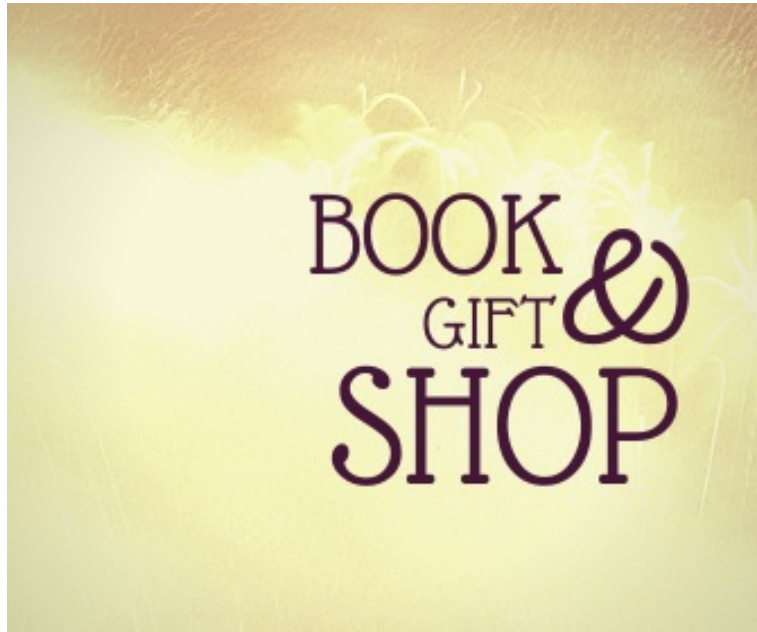
BM: My family has lived in Rye for generations.
