First Commencement at Stoneleigh College

Stoneleigh to Hear Bridges Special to THE NEW YORK TIMES.

RYE, N. H., June 25.—Governor Bridges of New Hampshire will address the graduating class of Stoneleigh College for young women at commencement exercises to be held at St. Andrews-by-the-Sea Monday morning. The exercises will mark the first commencement of Stoneleigh College, which was founded in September, 1934.





The junior college held only a few commencements before closing during World War II. A second effort to run a school at Stoneleigh, Atlantic Air Academy, lasted only three years.

Stoneleigh last served as a Franciscan Retreat House. In 1996 the property was cleared to make way for houses.
