Ogden Nash and his family spent their summers on Little Boar's Head, in North Hampton, NH. Using examples from their original stage work, "Home is Heaven," Pontine Theatre explores the ways in which Nash's life on the New Hampshire seashore influenced his poems, giving the reader insight into the man, his character, and his ideas about family, society, and nature. May House of the Month "The Ledges" 4 Red Mill Road

May's House of the Month's is a 3 ½ story Federalist, hip roofed home in Rye Beach owned by Douglas Nelson & Karin Cullity Nelson. The house dates from 1875-1878, per Ms. Sally Mackie, a descendant of original owner/builder. In 1904-5 an addition was erected following a fire which consumed about half of the original structure. The home retains the original 1878 Shingle Style gazebo & gardens.

Nathaniel Jenness gave the land to his son, Otis Simpson Jenness, and the Marston Family built the house for their daughter Anna Parsons Marston. Job Jenness may have been the builder. (he was a former proprietor of the Ocean House). After a jealous marriage (Anna was a "violet eyed, raven haired beauty"), Otis & Anna divorced in about 1900 and the house went out of the family.





Oral History from Philip Drake notes that there was an order of sisters (reformed young ladies from St Louis) living here in the 1920's.

Philip Drake also recounted that Franklin Delano Rooseveltstayed at 50 Red Mill Lane as a guest of the Castleman/Mackay's, as it was one of the only houses with a bedroom and bathroom suite on the first floor. Otherwise he stayed on board his yacht when visiting friends and family in the Rye Beach/Little Boar's Head area.

Irish maids occupied the servants' quarters over the kitchenfor many years. The servant callingsystem is still in the house. The oldice box is still intact as are the scullery pantry, food pantry and soapstoneand German silver sinks.

New Hampshire's largest Japanese Umbrella Pine tree is in theback yard, as are many specimen trees.

There is a rare Blanco & Nero fireplace surround in theliving room, from an ancient Italian quarry which has been played out for morethan 100 years.
