

- Planning for the 2023 400th anniversary of Rye is well under way


A NOTE FROM INCOMING RHS VICE PRESIDENT, ANNE RICHTER ARNOLD

St. Andrew's-By-The-Sea 30 Church Road, Rye Beach 1877

In the late 1800's, Rye Beach and Little Boars Head were popular summer residences for wealthy families from New York as well as St. Louis, Chicago and other midwestern cities. Church services were important to these summer residents who united together to build this chapel.

The summer chapel, St. Andrew's-by-the-Sea, has been a welcoming part of Rye since its first services at The Farragut Hotel in 1864. The chapel, on land donated from Frank A. and Elizabeth Philbrick, opened for its first service in 1876.

The chapel is a popular stop on the Rye History Trolley Tours, held three times each season. It was placed on the National Registry of Historic places in 2002.

St. Andrew's, designed by the architectural firm of Walter T. Winslow and George H. Wetherell, is a unique example of a small rural stone chapel, embellished by wooden trim, which owes much to both the Stick Style and late Gothic Revival style. Country English parish churches inspired the design of St. Andrew's. The interior is meant to look like a boat built upside down to incorporate the decorative wooden trusses which support the heavy slate roof. The walls are constructed of stones that may have been dragged from the shore. Each wall has five protruding round stones to form a cross.

The chapel has two Tiffany windows including the magnificent rose window on the rear wall. The other Tiffany window is the fourth window in the rear of the chapel on the north side. The chapel features a window by John LaFarge, whose windows can be seen at Trinity Church, Copley Square, Boston.

The first window nearest the main door on the south side is in memory of Ogden Nash, renowned poet and secretary of St. Andrew's for 25 years. The three windows

behind the altar were originally shown at the Philadelphia Exposition in 1876 and brought to St. Andrew's.

During its history, the chapel has served as the chapel for the girls' school at Stoneleigh Manor and later served the same function when that building was used as a military recovery hospital during World War II.



Preserving the building for today's use and future generations is an extraordinary and ongoing task. Cleaning and refurbishing of the chapel's interior wood ceiling, repair of several stained-glass windows, and restoration of the Lych gate have all been completed in recent years. Now St. Andrew's is embarking on the next stage of a nine-year restoration process.

The original 141-year-old slate roof is at the end of its serviceable life. Much time and investigation has been put into understanding the best way forward including considering synthetic slate. Natural slate was determined to be the best option because it was the original material of the chapel, is considered more attractive, and is more appropriate for a historic chapel. The cost to replace the slate is \$110,000.
