A Donation InDEED!

The Society recently received an important donation that has historical significance locally, nationally and to the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

It comes in the form of a handwritten deed, dated December, 1820, transferring pastureland in Rye from Benjamin Lincoln Lear of Washington, D.C. (acting on behalf of the Lear family of Portsmouth, NH) to Dr. Parsons of Rye, NH.

Know all man by these presents, that I Benjamin Lincoln Lear of the City of Washington, District of Columbia, the son and only child of Tobias Lear late opsaid City deceased and the grandson of Capitain Tolias Hampshire, in Consideration of the Sum of Two hundred and seventy six Dollars in hand pain to my grandmother Mrs Many Lear of Portsmen aforesaid, the widow of the Said Captain Tobias Pousous of Rege in the Lear, by Doctor State agressies, and for the further consideration of one Dollar by the Dais Parsons to me in hair · paid before the Sealing Volclivery ofthere presents the receipt whereof Thereby acknowledge, Ware granted, bargained dold aliened Enjerffeet and confirmed they these presents do prout bour gain Hell, alien Enfert and confirm unto the Social Doctor Parsons and tokis heirs all my right, little dinterest of whatever nature, in the a certain piece of pastere to lying in the town of Rye afresaid, and being

Benjamin Lincoln Lear (1792-1832), a lawyer, was the son of Colonel Tobias (1762-1816) and Mary Long Lear (1769-1793) of Portsmouth, NH and the godson of George Washington. Benjamin's father, Tobias, was the personal secretary to President Washington.

In this transaction, Benjamin is representing his grandmother, Mary Stilson Lear (1739-1829), widow of Captain Tobias Lear (1737-1781) of Portsmouth, in the sale of a parcel of pastureland in Rye, NH for \$276.00 to Doctor Parsons of Rye, NH.


According to the Northeast Document

Conservation Center of Andover, MA, the seals
are most likely starch seals and the ink is iron gall manuscript ink, a purpleblack or brown-black liquid made from iron salts and tannic acid from vegetable



sources. It is the standard ink formulation used in Europe for the 1400-year period between the 5th and 19th centuries.

Although the three handwritten pages are in poor condition with folds and tears, the majority of the document's contents are legible and have been transcribed for research purposes. Of particular interest is the original, intact, embossed seal and signature of the U.S. Secretary of State, John Quincy Adams (of Massachusetts), who would go on to become president in 1825.

Speaking of deeds, we want to highlight and thank one of our volunteers, Lydia Tilsley, for completing an incredible project. A while back, Doug Parsons donated a boxful of Parsons-family-related papers that needed to be inventoried. We called for a volunteer and Lydia generously stepped forward. During the past few months, she painstakingly opened envelopes, unfolded documents, deciphered 19th century handwriting, and filed each piece in archival folders to come up with a spreadsheet and descriptions for close to 70 documents, predominantly deeds.



This was an enormous and tedious undertaking and we are so grateful to Lydia for her time, commitment and patience in seeing this through to its completion. Now that we have the spreadsheet, we can, in time, 1) understand what we have 2) catalogue it in our database and 3) make it publicly available online.



THIS MONTH IN RYE HISTORY

November, 1775 **Rye Musters for War**

In the summer of 1775, Captain Joseph Parsons of Rye recruited a couple of dozen men, including "Nimshi Locke, Indian or negro," to stand guard at Fort William and Mary, watching for British warships. This small group became the nucleus for the larger company that Captain Parsons assembled in the fall.


The company roster of November, 1775, lists two lieutenants (William Seavey and Nathan Gilman), one ensign (Samuel Wallis), four sergeants, four corporals and 68 privates (again including Nimshi Locke).


Two Marden youngsters, Nathaniel and Joseph, served as fifer and drummer.

The Rye company joined General Washington's forces in Cambridge and remained until February or March, 1776, when the British evacuated Boston.





